Report on the performance of the Court's legal aid system in 2017*

Executive Summary

1. This first annual report on the implementation of the legal aid system is submitted at the request of the Committee on Budget and Finance.

2. In 2017, the legal aid programme of the International Criminal Court provided the reasonably necessary resources for the representation of defendants and victims, as mandated by the Rome Statute and the Rules of Procedure and Evidence, as well as by decisions adopted in Chambers.

3. This report offers a panoramic view of the budgetary performance of the legal aid programme.

I. Introduction

1. This report is presented at the request of the Committee on Budget and Finance ("the Committee"), in compliance with the reporting obligation of the International Criminal Court ("the Court") under Resolution ICC-ASP/11/Res.1.¹

II. Legal aid for defence

2. The Assembly of States Parties ("the Assembly") approved a budget of 3,528,190 to be used for legal aid for the defence in 2017. The table below offers a comparison between the assumptions on which this budget was established and actual developments in cases before the Court.

The final expenditure in this respect was €276,674, with an implementation rate of 69.16 per cent.

3. The final implementation rate of the defence budget, including the above-mentioned duty and ad hoc counsel, was 105.3 per cent,9 after absorption of the additional cost attributable to decisions by Chambers, as well as differences between budget assumptions and actual developments, which required the allocation of additional resources in several cases. The implementation rate also takes into consideration ⊕26,200 received following a request for access to the Contingency Fund for legal aid for defence.

4. With regard to the query raised by the Committee in relation to the legal aid funds provided by the Court to the defence in the cases of Gaddafi and Banda, the Registry confirms that funds were provided to the defence for Mr Banda in order to maintain a limited follow-up of the case considering the outstanding warrant for arrest.¹⁰ No funds have been paid to the defence for Mr Saif Al-Islam Gaddafi in the absence of any such request. For 2018, funds have been requested for both cases for the aforementioned reason, taking into consideration the appointment of counsel in Banda.

III. Legal aid for victims

The Assembly approved a budget of €1,002,800 to be used for legal aid for victims 5. in 2017. The table below offers a comparison between the assumptions on which this budget was established and actual developments in cases before the Court.

The final budget implementation rate for legal aid to victims was 90.7 per cent,¹² 6. after absorption of the additional cost attributable to differences between, on the one hand, budget assumptions and, on the other hand, actual developments and allocation, as appropriate, of additional resources to legal representation teams. The implementation rate also takes into consideration €425,260 received following a request for access to the Contingency Fund for legal aid for victims.

IV. Conclusions

7. The overall implementation rate for the legal aid budget in both the regular budget and the funds received following access to the Contingency Fund was 101.8 per cent.¹³

Of the total expenditure for legal aid for both defence and victims, €4,668,952 was 8. charged to the regular budget and €1,319,911 to the Contingency Fund.

9. Following the mandate received from the Assembly,¹⁴ the Registrar is in the process of preparing a new legal aid policy, with the assistance of a consultant, and will subsequently commence the requisite consultations with States Parties, associations of lawyers and non-governmental organizations.
