The Secretariat of the Assembly of States Parties presents its compliments to States Parties and with reference to its note verbale ICC-ASP/19/S/61 of 4 November 2020, has the honour to request that the credentials of representatives for the nineteenth session of the Assembly, to be held in The Hague from 14 to 16 December 2020, and to the resumption of the nineteenth session, tentatively scheduled to be held in New York from 17 to 23 December 2020, be submitted in advance of the session. This would facilitate the work of the Credentials Committee and of the Assembly.

Pursuant to rule 24 of the Rules of Procedure of the Assembly, the credentials should be issued by the Head of State or Government or by the Minister for Foreign Affairs or by a person authorized by either of them. Changes to the names of the alternates and advisers should be communicated in writing to the Secretariat of the Assembly by the representative of the State.

Credentials should, preferably, contain the name of the representative of the State, as well as the names of the alternates and advisers, for the nineteenth session and, separately, for the resumption of the nineteenth session. The credentials should be submitted in an official language of the Assembly of States Parties.

As of 14 December 2020, original credentials for the nineteenth session should no longer be sent to The Hague, but delivered directly to the Secretariat of the Assembly at the beginning of the session in The Hague and if possible, not later than 24 hours after the commencement of the session.
