Situation in the Democratic Republic of the Congo

In this situation, three cases are being heard before the relevant Chambers: *The Prosecutor v. Thomas Lubanga Dyilo; The Prosecutor v. Bosco Ntaganda*; and *The Prosecutor v. Germain Katanga and Mathieu Ngudjolo Chui*. The accused Thomas Lubanga Dyilo, Germain Katanga and Mathieu Ngudjolo Chui are currently in the custody of the ICC. The suspect Bosco Ntaganda remains at large. The trial in the case *The Prosecutor v. Thomas Lubanga Dyilo* started on 26 January, 2009. The trial in the case of *The Prosecutor v. Germain Katanga and Mathieu Ngudjolo Chui* started on 24 November, 2009.

Situation in Darfur, Sudan

In the situation in Darfur, Sudan, three cases are being heard: *The Prosecutor v. Ahmad Muhammad Harun* ("Ahmad Harun") and Ali Muhammad Ali Abd-Al-Rahman ("Ali Kushayb"); *The Prosecutor v. Omar Hassan Ahmad Al Bashir*, and *The Prosecutor v. Bahar Idriss Abu Garda*. Three warrants of arrest have been issued by Pre-Trial Chamber I for Harun, Kushayb and Al Bashir for crimes against humanity and war crimes. The three suspects remain at large. A summons to appear was issued for Abu Garda who appeared voluntarily before the Chamber on 18 May 2009. Abu Garda is not in the custody of the ICC. After the hearing of confirmation of charges, on 8 February, 2010, Pre-Trial Chamber I declined to confirm the charges.

Interacting with communitites

ICC raises awareness amongst women lawyers and human rights defenders in Kinshasa, DRC

To celebrate International Women's Day, the International Criminal Court organised a seminar for women lawyers and women human rights defenders in Kinshasa on Wednesday 10 March, 2010.

Many issues were addressed before the 90-strong audience of Congolese women legal professionals. Talking about the place of victims of sexual violence in the Rome Statute, Mr Mulenda, a Legal Representative of Victims in the case of *The Prosecutor v. Thomas Lubanga Dyilo*, drew a parallel with Congolese law on the matter. Ms Carine Bapita, another Legal Representative of Victims at the Court, examined the theme of the defence of victims by the Legal Representatives of Victims, based on her own experience in the Lubanga case. Fatou Sylla, from the Victims Participation and Reparations Section of the Court, also spoke about the participation of victims at the Court.

In his introductory comments, the representative of the ICC's Outreach Unit also addressed the Court's role and mandate, and its recognition of sexual crimes. He further recalled that in one of the trials currently before the ICC, the Katanga and Ngudjolo Chui case, the charges of sexual slavery and rape had been confirmed as both war crimes and crimes against humanity.

By integrating the seminar into this year's theme for Women's Month, "Equal rights, equal opportunities: Progress for all", the Outreach Unit in Kinshasa wanted to emphasise, not least in the choice of seminar speakers, two of whom were women, that "full respect for and enforcement of the rights of female staff are core values of the Court and are essential to its progress". This was another opportunity to encourage the participants to apply for inclusion on the ICC's list of Counsel.
