

Overview

Recognising the 20th anniversary of the Rome Statute, and the sixteenth operational year of the International Criminal Court, it is timely to review the achievements of international criminal justice and the challenges ahead.

International criminal law has become an established feature of public international law jurisprudence.

International criminal trials have advanced the end to impunity, and the work of the ICC and the international tribunals before it have arguable satisfied many on the legitimate aims of vast victim communities. That said, the prosecution of global crimes has not been without criticism.

There is much interest across South East Asia in the sentiments expressed by the Preamble to the Rome statute. Not all nations have chosen to become member states of the ICC. The reasons for a somewhat uneven accession in Asia and the Pacific reflect differing attitudes to the most appropriate methods for addressing global crime. Even so there is general agreement that the aspirations for international criminal justice should be energetically advanced, perpetrators must not go unpunished, and victims need protection from harm.
